Shabbat Parashat Miketz - 5766 - Why Another Two Years?

We find at the beginning of this week's Parashah, "It happened at the end of two years that Pharaoh was dreaming and behold! he was standing at the River..." (Bereshit 41:1) This two-year interval refers to the two years that had passed since the birthday of Pharaoh mentioned at the end of Parashat VaYeshev, when Yoseph's interpretations of the dreams of the "Sar HaMashkim," the Chief Cupbearer, and the "Sar HaOfim," the Chief of the Bakers, came true with the return of the Cupbearer to his former position, and the hanging of the Baker.

The question addressed here is, "Why was Yoseph confined in jail an additional two years?" This is not a new question, and Chaza'l have provided an answer; because Yoseph put his trust in a human being, the cupbearer, whom he asked to remember him, rather than in HaShem, Yoseph was punished with two additional years of incarceration ("Bereshit Rabbah" 89:3). The following is a suggestion for an alternate answer to the question.

Rav Aharon Soloveitchik, ZT"L, used to give a Hashkafah Shiur weekly, based on the Parashat HaShavua. When he came to Parashat VaYeshev, he indicated that he had a problem. Usually, it was possible for him to identify heroes and villains. But in VaYeshev, he had trouble finding a hero. Consider the possibilities. Yaakov Avinu did not seem to be using good parenting skills. Alright, the verse says, "And Yisrael loved Yoseph most, of all his sons, for he was the child of his old age..." (Bereshit 37:3) But at least modern psychology suggests that the parent should not make the preference obvious to the other siblings. Yet the verse (Bereshit, ibid.) says, "He made him a fine woolen tunic." And, indeed, the verse reports that it was indeed painfully obvious to the other brothers, "And his brothers realized that his father loved him more than all the other brothers, and they hated him; and they were unable to speak peaceably to him." (Bereshit 37:4)

The brothers, great founders of the "Shivtei Kah," the Tribes of G-d, though they were, committed one of the major sins of the Jewish People, the sale of their brother into slavery for a pair of shoes. And though Yoseph would play a highly beneficial role in Egypt, in protecting the Jewish People, as well as the other inhabitants of the area affected by the devastating famine, the brothers had no way of knowing that in advance. Thus, the beneficial role played later by Yoseph does nothing to assuage the guilt of the brothers for the sin of "Sinat Chinam," causeless hatred, and atonement would be necessary throughout the generations of Jewish History.

Yoseph himself, though he would eventually be crowned with the title of "Yoseph HaTzaddik," Yoseph the Righteous, yet suffered from a fault described by Kohelet, "There is no one so righteous in the land, that he does only good, and does not sin." (Kohelet 7:20) His tragic flaw was that his great gifts caused him to be a "showoff," and not to be as concerned as he should have been about the feelings of others. We see this from the very beginning of his "career" as a dreamer. Why did he have to describe in full detail to his brothers the dream that foretold his majesty? "And behold we were binding sheaves in the middle of the field when behold! your sheaves gathered around and bowed down to my sheaf." (Bereshit 37:7) And he continued in this vein, proclaiming his dreams of mastery to the rest of his family, "...Look, I dreamt another dream, where behold! The sun, the moon and eleven stars were bowing down to me." (Bereshit 37:9)

But to the two years! Yoseph found himself in the dungeon, along with the Chief of the Cupbearers and the Chief of the Royal Bakers. The two servants of Pharaoh had each dreamt a dream which sounded prophetic, but they could not determine their meaning, and became more and more morose. Yoseph, coming upon his cellmates, asked them, "Why do you appear downcast today?" (Bereshit 40:7) The Chief Cupbearer related his dream to Yoseph first, which involved three tendrils of a vine. Instantly comprehending its meaning, Yoseph said to his fellow prisoner, who waited for the interpretation with baited breath, knowing that his life was on the line, "...This is its interpretation: The three tendrils represent three days. Three days from now, Pharaoh will lift up your head and will restore you to your post..." (Bereshit 40:12-13) Then the Chief of the Bakers related his dream, which involved three wicker baskets. "Yoseph said, '...This is its interpretation. The three baskets are three days. Three days from now, Pharaoh will lift your head from you, and will hang you on a tree..." "(Bereshit 40:18-19) In each case, Yoseph did not get immediately to the point and reveal the true meaning – in one case, restoration to his former position; in the other, death by hanging. Instead, he inserted an unnecessary and ambiguous expression, "Pharaoh will lift your head" and made his listener wait for what must have seemed like an eternity. For this delay in delivering the verdict, committed twice, Yoseph was punished with an additional two years of incarceration. Thus, we see how precise are HaShem's judgments, particularly against the Righteous, whose job it is to use their gifts and blessings to serve HaShem and help their fellow human beings, not to play with them.
