The Origin of Exile and the Redemption of Chanukah

In the course of reading the final parashiot of Sefer Bereshit, which lead to bitter Exile and Slavery in Mitzrayim, our first national Exile, the narrative is carried forward by the story of Yoseph and his brothers, in their basically negative and hateful interaction, at least in the direction of the brothers towards Yoseph. By contrast, we celebrate the Holiday of Chanukah, also the story of a set of brothers, the Maccabim, interacting positively and heroically, in their military and spiritual struggle against the Hellenistic Jews and the Syrian Greeks, which resulted in the purification of the Temple.

The sale of Yoseph into slavery is held up as a negative paradigm of behavior, of "Sinat Chinam," "Hatred Without a Cause," which underlay countless Jewish tragedies, and for which the "Asarah Harugei Malchut," the "Ten Martyrs of the Roman Government," bore the guilt, and for which they and millions of Jewish martyrs went to their deaths. One difficulty is the expression "**Without Cause.**" Because the Torah in Parashat Vayeshev and earlier parashiot provided multiple causes: the greater love of Yaakov for Rachel, Yoseph's mother, compared to his other wives, Yoseph's involvement in "LaShon HaRa," Slander, against his brothers, Yaakov's visible preference for Yoseph, marked by his presentation to Yoseph alone of all the brothers, of a multi-colored tunic, and finally – **his dreams!** In each of the dreams that the Torah describes, the main theme is Yoseph's rule over his brothers. How's that for chutzpah from the kid brother! Causes, indeed, for a large degree of resentment and intense dislike, but certainly not the **murderous** hatred exhibited by the brothers.

Perhaps we can see the full measure of "Sinat Chinam," in the behavior of the brothers many years later, when they go down to seek food, propelled by the famine, and by a secret double mission, to search for Yoseph. But they seek **Yoseph the Slave**, and are in no way able to accept the idea that Yoseph's dreams were true, and that **he is the leader** in Mitzrayim. Because for many reasons, they should have recognized him. First of all was his voice, "HaKol Kol Yoseph!;" it should have given him away. Second was the biography of the great leader, who had indeed, as was well known, risen from his initial status of a slave brought to Egypt from the Land of the Ivrim. Then there were his features which, according to the Midrash, resembled their father's. He knew their birth order. There were so many reasons that they should have recognized him! But "Sinah mekalkelet et ha-shurah;" "Hatred deprives a person of logic and sound reason." They were so convinced that Yoseph had been wrong – dead wrong, that his dreams of superiority were utterly false, that this man who stood before them, who was unmistakably Yoseph, **could not be Yoseph!** Until Yoseph shattered their illusions – "And Yoseph said to his brothers, 'I am Yoseph; Is my father still alive?...' and again, "...And he said, I am Yoseph your brother, whom you sold to Mitzrayim.'" (Bereshit 45:3-4) For they had borne their hate-filled grudge all these years, that nothing else could have awakened them to the truth. The Torah commands, "Do not hate your brother in your heart." (Va Yikra 19:17) Hatred had clogged their spiritual arteries. That was the **great sin of these great men**; not to forgive, after all these years.

On Chanukah, we meet another group of great brothers, Kohanim, sons of Matityahu, men of courage and faith in HaShem. They were only five, also led by a Yehudah. The others were Shimon, Yochanan, Elazar and Yonatan. They faced an enemy far superior in every traditional military category: numbers, armament, animal support (the Maccabim had mules; the Syrian-Greeks had elephants). They were fully aware of this imbalance, but their great love of HaShem enabled the principle of "Ahavah mekalkelet et ha-shurah," "Love deprives a person of logic and sound reason" to become operative and give them the decisive advantage.

And they also affirmed the main lesson of Chanukah, spoken by the Angel to Yehoshua the High Priest, "This is the word of HaShem to Zerubavel, saying, 'Not through armies and not by might, **but through My Spirit**, says HaShem, Master of Legions. Who are you? O great mountain – before Zerubavel you shall become a plain! He shall bring forth the main stone to shouts of 'Beauty, Beauty to it!' " (Zechariah 4:6-7)
