Parashas Tzav – 5771 – Aspects of Megilas Esther

This essay will deal with various facets of Megilas Esther, which is read on Motzaei Shabbos Parashas Tzav ve-Parashas Zachor, and on Sunday Morning. It is at once a charming story, a source of Jewish Law, a play with aspects of Greek drama, a critique of Shakespeare long before he lived, written with the Holy Spirit by Mordechai and Esther.

On Purim we recite “Al HaNisim,” “For the Miracles,” a prayer of gratitude to HaShem for performing Miracles for us to save us from physical destruction. This prayer expresses the fundamental idea of “V’eNahapoch Hu,” that the evil plan of our enemy was overturned upon his head. The Miracle described in “Al HaNisim” was a “Nes Nistar,” a “Hidden Miracle,” as opposed to a “Nes Nigleh,” a “Revealed Miracle.” An example of the latter is “Krias Yam Suf,” the “Splitting of the Sea of Reeds,” which, though it was caused by the very fortuitous timing of natural phenomena, the result was of such a stupendous nature, that it is looked upon as an intervention by HaShem in history, as the Torah says, “*Moshe stretched out his hand over the sea, and HaShem moved the sea with a strong east wind blowing all the night, and He turned the sea-bed into dry land, and the waters split.*” (Shemos 14:21) Another example is when the Laws of Nature were actually violated, as when the prophet Elisha performed a feat of “Yesh MeAyin,” Creation “Ex Nihilo,” Creation of “Something from Nothing,” when he caused a multitude of jars of oil to be poured forth from a single jar (Melachim II 4:1-7)

The other type of Miracle, the “Nes Nistar,” the “Hidden Miracle,” occurs by the weaving together of highly improbable events, to produce a certain result; in the case of Purim, the “Nes Nistar” produced, or contributed to, the Salvation of the Jewish People. One of the first wildly improbable events was that Esther won the contest to be queen. After all, how many Jewish Miss America’s have there been? I believe there was just one, Bess Myerson by name, in the 89 years of the competition. Yet here was Esther, Miss Persia, and Queen of the Kingdom.

A second occurred on the night which the Megillah describes as “*On that night the sleep of the king was disturbed.*” (Esther 6:1) Instead of taking Advil, Achashverosh commanded that the recent Chronicles of the Kingdom of Persia be read to him. In them was recorded the heroic act of Mordechai, in informing upon two potential assassins, which had saved the king’s life. The king anxiously inquired whether Mordechai had received any reward for his act of bravery, and was told “Not a penny!” Achashverosh then asked, “*Who is in the royal courtyard?*” (Esther 6:4) He was answered that Haman was there. Now Haman was on a murderous mission to get the approval of the King for the hanging of Mordechai on a 50-cubit gallows he had erected in his backyard. When Haman came in, the king asked him what he thought should be done for someone whom the king wished to honor. Egomaniacal Haman, who assumed that the king meant him, described a reward, “*have them bring royal attire that the king has worn and a horse upon which the king has ridden, and upon which the king was crowned...*” (Esther 6:7-9), from which any objective observer would conclude that Haman had designs on the throne. Then the king shocked Haman by commanding him, “*Hurry, take the attire and the horse, as you have said, and do all this for Mordechai the Jew, who sits in the king’s gate. Do not omit a single detail from all that you suggested.*” (Esther 6:10) This was the beginning of the end for Haman.

Rabbi Yossi Fischer mentioned that an extremely clever Jew noticed something amazing in the list of Haman’s ten sons who were hanged: there is a small “T” off in “Parshanda sa” (Esther 9:7), a small “Shin” in “Parma shta” (Esther 9:7) and a small “Zayin” in “Vayezasa” (ibid.); as well as a large “Vav” in “Vayezasa.” Thus we have the date: Five thousand (from the large “Vav,” meaning the sixth thousand of the 6,000 years till Mashiach), together with the “T off-Shin-Zayin,” representing the year 1946, the year that six of the top (sic) Nazi generals were hanged in Nuremberg. Actually, eleven Nazi generals were scheduled to be hanged, but Goerring committed suicide, not wanting to give the Jews the satisfaction of hanging him.

In Shakespeare’s “Merchant of Venice,” Shylock is described as a money-lender, one of the few professions the Christians allowed the Jews to practice. Thus is given a come-uppance by the Megillah when the victims of the first day in Shushan are listed, together with those of the second day, as well as the total number of Persian-Median victims, and the Megillah says each time, “*but they did not lay their hand on the spoils.*” (Esther 9:10,15,16)

The Megillah is an ideal story for Jewish children (and adults). For it has heroes (Mordechai and Esther), a nasty villain (Haman) and a happy ending.
